ACTS OF THE APOSTLES: Acts 17:22-31

Then Paul stood in front of the Areopagus and said, "Athenians, I see how extremely religious you are in every way. For as I went through the city and looked carefully at the objects of your worship, I found among them an altar with the inscription, 'To an unknown god.' What therefore you worship as unknown, this I proclaim to you. The God who made the world and everything in it, he who is Lord of heaven and earth, does not live in shrines

made by human hands, nor is he served by human hands, as though he needed anything, since he himself gives to all mortals life and breath and all things. From one ancestor he made all nations to inhabit the whole earth, and he allotted the times of their existence and the boundaries of the places where they would live, so that they would search for God and perhaps grope for him and find him – though indeed he is not far from each one of us. For 'In him we live and move and have our being'; as even some of your own poets have said, 'For we too are his offspring.' Since we are God's offspring, we ought not to think that the deity is like gold, or silver, or stone, an image formed by the art and imagination of mortals. While God has overlooked the times of human ignorance, now he commands all people everywhere to repent, because he has fixed a day on which he will have the world judged in righteousness by a man whom he has appointed, and of this he has given assurance to all by raising him from the dead."

One: This is the word of the Lord

All: Thanks be to God.

REFLECTION: An Unknown God!

The summer of 1989 when I strongly felt my call to ministry, I began a love affair with religious and inspirational books. It was not my initial discovery of the thrill of learning, for that had already begun when I was four years old. But this specific time of exploring and discovering was euphoric. In that year, I read 126 books related to the subject of theology. It was an appetite that became insatiable to this day, however, now, much less intense, but still very satisfying. That is how the Athenians lived. They had a thirst for knowledge. They lived in the center of intellectual pursuits. They loved to read, or hear about anything new. It filled their waking hours.

Paul addresses these people in his first sermon to the Athenians. As he travelled in to their city, he noted their religiosity. Their hunger was evident in their portrayal of idols and their altar built to their "unknown God." In spite of their great search, they remained empty and unfulfilled. They heard his teachings about Jesus and this was so very different from their pagan gods that they brought him before the high court to further explain.

Paul does not criticize or destroy their illusions of deities, he decides to build on it. He is quite adept at tailoring his message to his audience. He introduces them to their "unknown God." He testifies to what he knows to be the truth and enlightens them about the incarnation of Jesus, his life, works, death and resurrection. In that portrayal they could see for themselves that Jesus was not just one of the everyday deities, he was in a class all his own. He was the one before which the whole world must give account. He is the one who sets the standards of righteousness and will judge the world accordingly. His claims then were disruptive as they are now.

From our golden towers today, we have created for ourselves our own golden images, we worship money, worldly success, and celebratory status, crowding out the claims of Jesus.

Paul's arguments are presented with wisdom and logic. He indicates that humans are created with a yearning for God. "Thou has made us for thyself, O Lord, and our hearts are restless until they rest in thee." The searching is innate to us; we instinctively grope for God in the darkness. "In him we live and move and have our being." This great universe of ours "is not separate from God, but in God."

We say, or more specifically, I say, there are many paths to God and it does not matter which one you take. Paul would not agree with this. He was no universalist. He was respectful of other religions, of pagan ways, but he testified to the truth as he knew it through his own experience. The quandary we struggle with is how do we speak to spiritual hunger around us and be able to offer our truth, and honesty in our experience of God without shutting out other ways to experience the holy?

Paul proves himself to be adept at listening to and answering what drives the people of Athens. He sees their creative potential, their art, culture and learning and he ties it all back in to God's great gifts to us in many forms. All good things that we enjoy come from God, our Creator. Around us lie the diversity and extraordinary creative endeavors, the human potential to be co-creators with God through the beauty of artistic expression. The more we reach and delve deeper, the more we make our connection with the one Unknown God, "in whom we live and move and have our being." Amen.

On that day you will know that I am in my Father, and you in me, and I in you. They who have my commandments and keep them are those who love me; and those who love me will be loved by my Father, and I will love them and reveal myself to them."

REFLECTION: The Advocate!

LeDerick Horne told this story at a summit conference about growing up with a learning disability which was diagnosed in third grade. He was separated out from his class and put in a glorified resource room, which was really a teacher's storage closet.

His anxiety and self-doubt swiftly overtook him and he had to contend with feeling like a second-class citizen all his growing up years. He went on to graduate and become a speaker for people with disabilities.

At one conference in which he was a speaker, Carlos came up to him to tell him about his story. He, too, was learning disabled. He persevered through high school and one day attended a lecture in which LeDerick was speaking about how he had overcome his own disability. Carlos said it gave him the hope to carry on and he was also able to graduate and go on to college. The one who had experienced what it was like to be disabled became the Advocate for many others like him.

There are many such stories of others, and even some among you, who have taken on the role of Advocate to assist others to find their way.

In today's Gospel, John tells us about Jesus' words to his disciples before he is about to leave them. "And I will ask the Father and he will give you another Advocate, to be with you forever." "This is the Spirit of truth, whom the world cannot receive, because it neither sees him nor knows him. You know him, because he abides with you, and he will be in you." "I will not leave you orphaned." Jesus sticks close to the disciples while he is in physical form, but once he leaves, he intends for them not to be abandoned. They will continue to receive an overseer, a comforter to be with them always. Jesus assures them that they will not be alone in their efforts to live a life shaped by love.

This discourse comes in the midst of a chaotic time for Jesus. He is nearing the cross, the last supper has been memorialized, the kiss of betrayal has occurred and, the feet have been washed with great humility. Jesus knows he has little time and he desires to leave his companions with hope.

This same Spirit that Jesus asks his Father to be with his closest friends, indwells in us and helps us to live in a world not dominated by tyrannical power (although this is becoming more of a reality) but one in which the influences of consumerism and greed dominate, and where love is not the overriding criteria for daily life.

The love to which God calls us does not intend class differences or a hierarchy, it calls us into a truth that all are part of this generous love. God's love is not only true and freely given, it is the source of all life.

Anxiety without Jesus is a fact of life through all the ages not just with his chosen disciples but also with us today. Jesus' response addresses our needs as well as his immediate audience. He suggests that loving him and keeping his word is the essential calm for all. He reminds us that access to the Father continues through our adherence to keeping his commands to "love one another as I have loved you."

This advocate is not only a warm comfy feeling, it is one who stands up for us, a force that brings about action. Jesus is the Spirit of truth. In his healing, teaching and dying, he remains "in" us. We know this not to be an individual mystical union, but one in a community of faith. Jesus is present among us when we keep his commandments to love and serve one another. We see his presence in our action to and with a caring community. Amen.
