
♦ Worship Next Week **♦**

Next week is Mother's Day, celebrated as Christian Family Sunday in our churches. As we are still under isolation orders, many family members are unable to celebrate this day with each other. It is an especially difficult time for those who are confined to hospitals, nursing and retirement homes and unable to have visitors. We pray for God's blessings on each of you and your loved ones during this challenging time.

This week we will be talking about Stephen, the first Christian martyr, who was stoned for speaking out about his beliefs and preaching the gospel. Obviously, there is a major rift with the growing Christian community. Up to this point, the Christians had still been part of the Jewish synagogues, but animosity is growing and persecution is in full swing as they begin to see the radical divergence of the two religions.

These people were neighbours and friends. One day they held common beliefs and shared their stories but the historical fate of Jesus had severed those ties and caused a major rift. We are first introduced to Paul, then known as Saul, in this scene in his former role as an ardent persecutor. He will come to have a much different role as we follow the trail of the new church.

Stephen remains resolute in the face of impending death, prays for his persecutors with a holy determination. Christians begin to scatter but the holy will of God through the Holy Spirit will not be stopped and the movement is propelled out into the world.



Our second scripture moves to the Gospel of John. Again this is one of the most beloved and familiar scriptures. My earliest memories as a child were memorizing this passage: Let not your heart be troubled, followed by the words of John 3:16 – For God so loved the world....

Instructions are dispersed to the disciples about how to live as Jesus taught when Jesus would not be present to guide them. These are known as Jesus' Farewell speeches to his group of followers who have not understood that he is about to leave them.

You, like I have been present at many funerals when these words have been offered as comfort and encouragement. In my Father's house are many mansions. In these promises, Jesus reveals an intimacy shared with his Father that is opened up to all who make the journey in His name. "I and the Father are one." As you have seen me, you also have seen the Father. John's consistent message drives home that Jesus was with God from the beginning of creation as the Word; Jesus has incarnated in the role of the Son for His earthly mission; and Jesus is returning to the Father where he will enter back into the Godhead in glory. Another glimpse of the mystical trinity of God.
