REFLECTION: Beauty of Creation! - Psalm 104: 24-34, 35b

In wisdom and divine intelligence, God created the universe and continues to create in majesty and splendor. In every facet of creation beauty exists, awe inspiring beauty that moves us beyond words. We see it in the powerful and uniqueness of nature as it touches our hearts and elevates our souls.

God has intricately designed our world not just for function, but also to care for and nourish us. Breath taking panoramas await our exploration teeming with diversity, colour and imagination. No matter where we travel around the globe there are wonders to behold.

God has gifted us with: flowers that are pleasing to the eye and give of delightful aromas; birds that chirp in chorus; animals that serve as pets and guides and ones that roam and hunt; rivers and waters that swirl and glisten in rhythmic flow; shade trees and flowering shrubs; carpeted hills and valleys; roaring spectacular falls. Everywhere we look, we see the imprint of the hand of God in our world.

The psalmist sees a sense of order in creation and behind this order, a purpose for life that is grounded in God. There is praise for both creation and its sustenance by a God who is not absent or apart from his work. Each new day begins with a light caused by the rotation of the earth in the precise formula needed to maintain its existence. The very ground of existence is a powerful and generous and gracious God whose Spirit flows through and in all in ways that we are not able to understand. God's ordering contains potentially dangerous waters along with smooth flowing currents and sets night after day and a variety of seasons to allow harvest and rest and peaceful interaction between predators and people. It is a design that allows interaction and cross-pollination and a chain of supporting habitats that benefit the earth's species.

O Lord, how manifold are your works! In wisdom you have made them all. Sheer wonder and awe. Breath and food – spiritual and physical co-exist in the totality of life.

Yet, the psalmist is all too aware that the unknown in the equation is that of humans who can selfishly shake the stability of the earth and plunge it into despair. The psalmist asks that God not let that happen. The beauty of God's world for the use of all must not be exploited and used for selfish ends.

The gifts of the spirit are renewing and life-giving and an invitation to see, hear, taste and touch all that God has given is good. As a people who have been endowed with this powerful spirit, we take in what is needed with grateful hearts and we share with all. Even when we, in our misguided moments misuse what has been given to us, God continues to send forth the Spirit to the earth and the universe is renewed.

We are reminded by the psalmist that we have been placed here as stewards of the earth, entrusted in caring for rather than consuming creation. This time in our history of pandemic may be an opportunity to transform our lifestyles from consumerism to a life in harmony with creation. "I will sing to the Lord as long as I life; I will sing praise to my God while I have being." This hymn of praise is on our lips as we ponder this amazing love that has created this playground in which we live, move, and have our being.

Our "down time" is an opportunity to rethink our place in this planet, and to remember whose we are.

ACTS OF THE APOSTLES: Acts 2:1-21

When the day of Pentecost had come, they were all together in one place. And suddenly from heaven there came a sound like the rush of a violent wind, and it filled the entire house where they were sitting. Divided tongues, as of fire, appeared among them, and a tongue rested on each of them. All of them were filled with the Holy Spirit and began to speak in other languages, as the Spirit gave them ability.

Now there were devout Jews from every nation under heaven living in Jerusalem. And at this sound the crowd gathered and was bewildered, because each one heard them speaking in the native language of each. Amazed and astonished, they asked, "Are not all these who are speaking Galileans? And how is it that we hear, each of us, in our own native language? Parthians, Medes, Elamites, and residents of Mesopotamia, Judea and Cappadocia, Pontus and Asia, Phrygia and Pamphylia, Egypt and the parts of Libya belonging to Cyrene, and visitors from Rome, both Jews and proselytes, Cretans and Arabs — in our own languages we hear them speaking about God's deeds of power." All were amazed and perplexed, saying to one another, "What does this mean?" But others sneered and said, "They are filled with new wine."

But Peter, standing with the eleven, raised his voice and addressed them, "Men of Judea and all who live in Jerusalem, let this be known to you, and listen to what I say. Indeed, these are not drunk, as you suppose, for it is only nine o'clock in the morning. No, this is what was spoken through the prophet Joel: 'In the last days it will be, God declares, that I will pour out my Spirit upon all flesh, and your sons and your daughters shall prophesy, and your young men shall see visions, and your old men shall dream dreams. Even upon my slaves, both men and women, in those days I will pour out my Spirit; and they shall prophesy. And I will show portents in the heaven above and signs on the earth below, blood, and fire, and smoky mist. The sun shall be turned to darkness and the moon to blood, before the coming of the Lord's great and glorious day. Then everyone who calls on the name of the Lord shall be saved.'

REFLECTION: Wind and Spirit! - Acts 2:1-21

In the late nineties, while I was at Fairfield-St. David's our Picnic service fell on the day of Pentecost. We met at Dundurn Park in the pavilion where we set up our sound system and I began the service. It was a very windy day, and as I began to preach from the lectionary for that day about the coming of the Holy Spirit on the people gathered, the wind caught the speakers and was amplified with a roar. Everyone was electrified with the significance of the moment. It was as if we were transported in time, standing before Peter in awe.

through the gift of sound effects used in film we have a rushing wind....

The Holy Spirit is alive and well in our church. We have been baptized and empowered by the same Holy Spirit that came upon the disciples. It was a commission to spread the message of God's saving love to the ends of the earth.

The apostle, Paul, says that the Holy Spirit helps us in our weakness, sends spiritual gifts to enrich our worship, helps us determine who is to lead our community, how we relate to outsiders and the direction we are to take as a spiritual community.

It wasn't always clear how to interpret the outpouring of the Spirit as it did not appear in black and white so even in the early days there was dissension amongst the elders on many aspects of religious life. As the Christian community grew, the Holy Spirit was stifled in favour of structure dictating teaching, worship, leadership, and decision-making. Mention of the Holy Spirit fell out of favour.

Charismatic and Pentecostal voices called out for recovery of the Holy Spirit in the role of worship and the experience of "signs and wonders."

God's Spirit at work in the world was not new to the Day of Pentecost, it had been at work since the beginning of time. Recorded in Genesis as the life-giving breath of God. Again, we hear of its presence in Isaiah who promises the Spirit will rest with wisdom and understanding on the people during the time of exile in Babylon.

Each age traverses through a wilderness of change that brings fear of transition. Many of you who grace our pews know this fear. While nothing changes inside, the world outside is in a constant state of flux. Unpredictable economies, life transitions, church closures, health challenges, and out of the ordinary world events, bring fear and mourning, but they also bring hope and promise and new possibilities.

Today, we celebrate the birthday of the church year. In a sense, it is a graduation party for the disciples who have spent their three years in internship preparing for striking out on their own. They have been fully prepared and authenticated by the One in whose name they and, we, go forth.

The responsibility shifts to us to continue this challenge to call upon this Spirit to locate, claim and utilize our unique voices, gifts and skills with which we set out to love and serve. This allpowerful Spirit is loose upon the world, never intended to be harnessed for our individual use. Its life-giving power is creative and sustaining in all the communities of the world.

These were not early morning intoxicated revelers; they were filled with the Spirit that had been foretold in the book of Joel and promised by the Lord, Jesus. It comes in not as a meek, quiet entity but rather as a force of power. It is a reminder that the Spirit does not always arrive as a still, small voice or a faint stirring in the heart. The Holy Spirit's power is not always fragile, subtle or polite. Even today it can be electric, atomic, and volcanic. Within our worldwide worship there are examples of thundering choirs, over the top praise bands, hand clapping and rock star preaching. (I missed that class)

The beauty of Holy Spirit infused worship is that it may take the form of ecstatic, dramatic, or profound spiritual experience, or it may gently and subtly roll in washing over the congregant with a sublime sense of building ripple by ripple towards our identification as sons and daughters of God, as part of the divine family. Amen.

INVITATION TO OFFERING

When we think of your church, O God, we might think of the formidable stone structure, or the beautiful stained glass windows that are admired but then forgotten when the church gets locked up. We might think of the grass that needs cutting and the custodian mopping the floors. What we hear today is that your church is not the physical building, O God, but rather it is a sacred story of a life laid down in the outstretched arms of love, in a circle of friendship and a one-minute speech, heard in many languages, about what the Spirit is doing and how important this is to the betterment of people's lives, as kindness and goodness are nurtured in this world. It's amazing that you can take what is offered and make it your church as you did on the day of Pentecost and now with us.

In this trying time when we cannot worship in our beloved sanctuary, we come together in hearts and minds from our homes and we thank you for our people who carry on the tradition of keeping your church of Melrose alive so that we may represent you in our corner of the world. Thank you for the gifts of our dedicated people who continue to make this work possible.
